

United Way reaches out to you and the community

United Way of Weld County announced that the Family Wise Prescription Drug Discount Card program has been an outstanding success. The discount prescription cards are available at no cost to help people with no health insurance or prescription coverage and can also be used by everyone that needs to buy medicine not covered by insurance, Medicaid or Medicare plans. The cards have no usage or age limits, income requirements or registration forms and cards can be used immediately.

Jeannine Truswell, Executive Director for United Way of Weld County stated: "This program helps us address one of our focus areas: Strengthening Families and Adults and helping them achieve self-sufficiency. Health care costs are an issue for many households. We are most grateful to the sponsors of this program and to the pharmacies in our community that have voluntarily agreed to accept the Family Wise cards providing a savings to people in need."

United Way of Weld County currently ranks number one amongst Colorado communities in the number of cards used and cost savings. Records indicate that over \$39,000 was saved by Weld County residents who used the discount prescription cards from January 2007 through February 2008.

Your Brain is Magnificent Dr. Bruce Perry visits Greeley

United Way of Weld County, in partnership with the Weld County Department of Social Services, was pleased to bring Dr. Bruce Perry, an internationally recognized authority on children in crisis, to Greeley.

Dr. Perry, the Provincial Medical Director in Children's Mental Health for the Alberta Mental Health Board and Senior Fellow of the Houston based, Child Trauma Academy, presented to nearly 1000 people at three presentations.

More than 400 local and state mental health professionals, health care providers, home visitation staff, social workers and parents learned about relational poverty that children in today's society are experiencing. By working with children to increase their positive relational opportunities they are more likely to read at grade level by the third grade and more likely to graduate from high school. These successful students are more likely to pursue higher education, enter the job market and become responsible citizens.

Perry was also the Keynote Speaker at the Second Annual

United Way Love to Learn Conference. Addressing 450 childcare professionals on why the early years really matter and how to work with the children coming into their care whose social, emotional and behavioral development may have been stunted in their early years.

Community and business leaders attended Dr. Perry's third presentation at the Greeley Country Club. The Promises for Children guests listened intently as Perry spoke about why early childhood is so important and how it impacts our society. Heads were nodding in agreement as he stated, "Many of today's social problems, such as juvenile delinquency, drug, gang and school drop-out rates, can be traced back to the lack of positive, nurturing experiences children receive during the first five years of life."

"We needed every business leader, teacher, grandparent and parent to hear what Dr. Perry shared," exclaimed Vonda Shirazi who attended the February luncheon. "The power of his knowledge could

change how each of us interacts with children - whether they be in our family, or a child we meet in the community."

Dr. Perry commended Weld County on creating United Way of Weld County's Promises for Children's Early Childhood Council and its work to improve the lives of young children.

No way home and no food when you get there... who do you call?

A North Colorado Medical Center social worker recently called United Way's 2-1-1 Info-Line asking for a food box for one of her clients. The client, a 50-year-old woman from an outlying community was to be discharged from the hospital that evening at 5:00 p.m. She reported that there was no means of transportation to get home and there was no food in her house. NCMC provided a taxi voucher for her transportation, but there was still the issue of available nutrition. The United Way 2-1-1 call specialist contacted a local church for availability of a food box. The church had a food box for the social worker to pick up for her client. Thanks to YOU this woman was able to return to her home and continue her healing process.

United Way is extremely grateful to every youngster, family, senior citizen, company employee, corporate executive, government official, nonprofit organization and foundation who not only contributed

dollars, but also understand the importance of working together and how it touches the lives of many.”

Executive Director, Jeannine Truswell reported, “One hundred twenty individuals are new members to the Leadership Giving program, the United Way Tillers Club. Over 75 parents and children attended a Parent Education Symposium

entitled "Promises for Children – Success for Family Growth," sponsored by the United Way of Weld County's Promises for Children, Weld County's Early Childhood Initiative, and the Hoff Counseling Department at Hoff Elementary School in Keenesburg.

Being a parent is fun and a joy, but...

Parents and children who attended this extraordinary event had an evening of learning opportunities and fun activities. After dinner, children joined the Greeley's ABC Child Development Center staff to participate in games in the gym or create arts and crafts. Parents were engaged listening to Liz Hardy, Child Advocacy Resource and Education's very own 'Super-Nanny!' share tips about raising children. Families were reunited for a lively

game of Bingo before all went home.

Raising children is a very important role

because parents are a child's first teachers. Being a parent is fun and a joy, but it can also be hard and exhausting. The Parent Education Symposium provided parents with tools that can be used to reduce parenting frustrations and increase contentment for children and parents. The



counseling department at Hoff Elementary School was delighted with the participation and looks forward to hosting future events for families.

Schools like Hoff Elementary have a distinct opportunity to work in partnership with families in ways that strengthen them. United Way's Promises for Children program appreciates the opportunity to improve the parenting experience with families in Weld County.



Marion is 74 years old. She refinanced her home so she could help her daughter get back on her feet after an ugly divorce that left her with almost nothing. An adjustable rate mortgage has now placed Marion at risk of losing her home as she cannot afford the monthly payments.

Last year Weld County had one of the highest foreclosure rates in the nation with a total of 2,869 foreclosures. The impact on our community and the lives of people is significant. In response to this concern, United Way has joined hands with several other community organizations and concerned citizens to form the Weld Foreclosure Prevention Coalition.

2,869 Weld County Foreclosures

Focus of the group is two-fold:

- 1) Education and awareness to identify concerns for households early and directs them to help and assistance that can often prevent foreclosure;
- 2) Build the capacity of current housing counseling programs and develop a collaborative approach for services to help people.

Led by chairman Steve LaForest, with Mortgage Services, 50 members of the WFP Coalition are working to develop and implement strategies. Members represent government, business and the non-profit community.

Bringing Our Community Together for Children Northern Colorado's 27th Annual Children's Festival



The 27th Annual Northern Colorado Children's Festival was held on Saturday, March 29th at the Island Grove Event Center. This free festival models positive learning experiences with a variety of hands-on and story-

telling activities. Over 70 booths provided excellent information, health and safety tips and information on how to get connected to vital parent/child related resources.

The Weld County Department of Public Health and Environment brought an on-site immunization clinic for children and provided 34 immunizations to 12 children. Vaccinations were provided for only \$14.70 per inoculation, but no one was turned away because of inability to pay. Many parents brought their child's immunization record to the event for review.



Numerous parents took advantage of the free car-seat safety inspections provided by Drive Smart Weld County, where 10 car seats were confiscated due to being recalled and 15 new car seats were given. A total of 51 car seats were inspected to ensure that they were not recalled or installed incorrectly.



Each child was able to choose a free book of their choice to take home as they entered the festival. Books were compliments of United Way of Weld County's Promises for Children.

Thanks to YOUR support of United Way over 1,300 children participated in this free, exciting and fun event. The overall attendance including parents, caregivers and grandparents was estimated at 5,000.

Twenty-nine percent of the calls 2-1-1 received from our residents are for basic human needs. Month to month the greatest needs in our community are food, utility bill assistance, housing assistance and clothing.

How does 2-1-1 work?

On a day-to-day basis, 2-1-1 provides all kinds of referrals to people in need: Are they looking for affordable day care for their child? Are they faced with medical bills they can't deal with? Do they need a mentor for their troubled teen? Do they need pre-natal care? Do they want to volunteer? The 2-1-1 Info-Line is a tremendous resource that connects people in need with services that can help.
